
On a final note I would like to thank everyone in our school and community for all they have done this term to make the term so successful in so many ways.

Reading

In reading we have studied the books 'Once Upon a Small Rhinoceros' & The Treasure box. Students have been learning about 'Marking the Motivation' - which is being able to explain why a character in a book did or said something. The kids are also working on expanding their responses to make them more interesting. We also loved having 3 preppies in our classroom for a day last week - and the kids were very motivated to do some partner reading with them!



Writing

In writing students have been having some fun with stories! We have completed an activity where students worked in small groups and had 45mins to each write one sentence and make a whole story – some of which were hillarious. The students have also been working on publishing their 'Fractured Fairy Tales' and will finish the term with free writing.



In maths students have been collecting data and using it to make bar graphs! It has been a very hands-on unit and the kids have loved it! We will look at other kinds of graphs this week and complete a post test on the unit.

Grade 5/6 Classroom Report

Around the School

Infectious Disease Exclusion Periods

Diarrhoeal illness - In an outbreak of gastroenteritis, exclude until there has not been vomiting or a loose bowel motion for 48 hours, and for all other diarrhoeal illnesses exclude until there has not been vomiting or a loose bowel motion for 24 hours

Influenza and influenza like illnesses - Exclude until well

Ringworm, scabies, pediculosis (head lice) - Exclude until the day after appropriate treatment has commenced

Measles - Exclude for at least 4 days after onset of rash




